Mooncakes

In Suzanne Walker's *Mooncakes*, teen witch Nova works at her grandmothers' bookshop, learning magic and helping keep the town safe from the supernatural. All is well until her childhood friend and crush,

a werewolf named Tam, returns to town to battle a demon in the forest. Unable to call any one place home, with no family to back her, and with a



cult pursuing her eager to use her wolf magic for evil, Tam asks Nova to help her learn to channel her powers for good.

Set against the backdrop of fall in a cozy small town, Tam and Nova's dormant feelings are rekindled as both girls discover more about themselves in the quest to defeat the demon before the cult can claim Tam's powers.

I really enjoyed this graphic novel and would recommend it to anyone looking for a wholesome, cozy, and whimsical read. The art was bright and colorful, and gave dimension to the enchanting vibes that come with witchcraft, keeping the reader engaged despite the story not including a ton of action. The story also includes an incredible amount of diversity. Nova is Chinese American and wears hearing aids, Tam is non-binary and uses they/them pronouns, and Nova's grandmothers are in a same-sex relationship, all of which is respected and shown in a positive, empowering way. Overall, this was a fun, quick read that I believe many will enjoy.

Ella Enchanted



The fairy-given gift Ella received at birth - obedience - is more of a curse. Anything you tell her to do, she must obey. When her father remarries a wicked woman, Ella's new stepsisters learn her secret and are quick to abuse it. The only solution Ella can think of is to run away and find the fairy that gave her this "gift." While on her journey, Ella can't help but fall for Prince Char. Unfortunately, until she is free of the curse, she can't marry the prince. If any enemies ever found out about her gift, they could order her to kill Char or worse. Will Ella find the fairy and get her happily ever after, or will she be stuck under the power of her stepfamily forever?

Ella Enchanted is one of my favorite books and I've read it more times than I can remember. There's just

something so unique about it! Every time I read it, there's at least one scene I rediscover. Ella is a strong and distinctive main character,




and I love her story. The book is very different from (and much better than) the movie. For the most part, the plots are completely different! The book is a retelling of the Cinderella fairy tale, while the movie is not. In other words, just because you've seen the movie doesn't mean you can't read the book! Stamped: Racism, Antiracism, and You

Take much of what you thought you knew about America's history and set it aside to explore the facts from a different point of view. This

look at our history and our present is likely going to rattle you. Through the lens of **Kendi** (who won the **National Book Award** for his original version—



Stamped from the Beginning) and Reynolds, who has

an incredible way with words and perspective himself, you have one incredibly powerful book.

Add to this amazing writing duo Jason Reynolds' performance as the reader for the audiobook and you'll be blown away. It's rhythmic, it's poetic, it's humble, and it's real. It's hard to imagine anyone else bringing such clarity and power to a history that has long been misunderstood. Reynolds' voice discussing the differences between assimilationists, racists, and anti-racists with his unique style makes this book and its audio version an essential book for the present in which we live. He repeatedly says this book is not a history, and he's right. It is as much about today as it is the past. While this book is directed to a YA audience, it's a must read for everyone. Both the book and audiobook are available from the library.
