This past year was a busy year for the Margaret E. Heggan Free Public Library. More than 150,000 people walked through the doors of the library in 2010, and more than 1,400 new library cards were issued. Almost 230,000 items were checked out during the year, saving our customers approximately \$4.3 million in 2010.

In March, the library welcomed a new Library Director. Kim Rinaldi came to the library from the Brielle Library in Monmouth County and has been a welcome addition to the library.

To celebrate National Library Week in April, the Heggan Library once again joined with eight other Gloucester County libraries for "Meet the Authors." This year the event was held at the new Monroe Township Library in Williamstown. Thirty-eight local authors participated.

When Governor Christie's budget was announced in April, funding for statewide library



services was cut by 74%. On May 6, library staff members attended a rally in Trenton to

"Save NJ Libraries." Thanks to the efforts of thousands of library lovers in our community and across the state, some funding was restored. Through consolidation and negotiations, most library services were retained.

In June, the library was awarded a \$1,200 grant from the New Jersey State Library to purchase a computer station dedicated to Homework Help NJ. The money is part of



a grant to the NJSL from the Gates Foundation Staying Connected program. The Heggan Library was one of 10 libraries in the state to be awarded this grant because the library has one of the top ten usage rates of Homework

Help NJ. Homewor Help and the Adult Career Center are online tutoring services provided by the State Library through a donation from PSE&G.

In July, bids were opened for renovations to the new library. The contract was awarded to Landmark Homebuilders, LLC. Demolition began in September and construction should be complete this spring.

In July, the library was notified that it was selected as one of five libraries in the state to be the recipient of the New Jersey Council for the Humanities 2010 Book Award Collection. The 33 nonfiction books were presented to the library on November 16.



Between June 28 and August 19, more than 1,700 attended the library's summer reading programs. This year's theme was "Make a Splash @ your library." Children enjoyed many water-themed activities all summer.



On October 6, the library joined with all the other libraries in Gloucester County to celebrate "20 Libraries – 20 Years of Service." The event commemorated the 20th anniversary of LOGIN, a library consortium that allows all the libraries in Gloucester County, and some from Salem County, to share an online catalog. Heggan Library cardholders can borrow materials from other LOGIN libraries.

While 2010 was a very busy year for the library, 2011 will be even busier when the library moves to its new location in the spring.

Library receives Talking Book & Braille Center Kiosk

Do you know someone whose ability to read is affected by vision loss or impairment, physical handicap, or a learning disability?

Outspoken

If you or someone you care for are a NJ Veteran or resident who is blind or disabled, you may be eligible for FREE li-

brary services delivered to your door.

The New Jersey State Library Talking Book & Braille Center (TBBC), formerly known as the Library for the Blind and Handicapped, provides

public library services by mail to New Jersey Veterans and residents of all ages who cannot easily read standard printed materials because of a visual impairment, physical handicap, or a learning disability.

In addition, the TBBC announces the roll out of the new Outspoken Library.

Over forty free-standing Outspoken Library computer kiosks will be delivered to participating public libraries across New Jersey, and the Margaret E. Heggan Free Public Library has received one of them. The goal is to give every New Jersey public library patron an opportunity to learn about and explore the Talking Book & Braille Center's free library programs

> that are available to anyone who cannot read a standard print book.

> Each Outspoken Library kiosk has live links to services administered through TBBC such as TBBC's very own

Audiovision Newspaper Reading Service and the National Federation for the Blind's Newsline with over 300 newspapers, magazines and wire services. Access to the Braille and Audio Reading Download (BARD) site is also available. BARD currently provides over 18,000 digital books for download which can be played on a TBBC issued digital talking book player. Video demonstrations and instructions on how to do a BARD download are also found on each Outspoken Library kiosk. Please see a librarian for information.

TBBC, a division of the New Jersey State Library, is supported by funding from the State of New Jersey and the Institute of Museum and Library Services through its Grants to States program and is a cooperating network library of the National Library Service for the Blind and Physically Handicapped of the Library of Congress. The New Jersey State Library is affiliated with Thomas Edison State College.

The library has been adding more and more Playaway Audiobook titles to the library's collection.


Earbuds for the Playaways are available in the library for \$1, or you may use you own. You must supply your own battery.
