Thirteen Little Blue Envelopes

an eBook Review by L. B.

Maureen Johnson penned several
works in our Teen section. Now, with
our expansion to a virtual library, her
works are available in eBook and
audio formats as well.



I first enjoyed Johnson's writing in *Let It Snow*, a book of three romances written in cooperation with **John Green** and **Lauren Myracle**.
Johnson's

story, "The Jubilee Express," is my favorite of the three. Considering Green and Myracle, who I see as heavy hitters in YA, I found a strong need to explore Johnson's work further.

Thirteen Little Blue Envelopes does not disappoint! Ginny (Virginia) is a seventeen year old on summer break following a quest devised by her much beloved, but now deceased, Aunt Peg. Aunt Peg is the most interesting person Ginny has ever met. Just being near Peg makes Ginny feel she, by extension, is interesting too. The quest is designed to help Ginny better understand her aunt's life. Peg sends Ginny clues and tasks in each of thirteen sealed blue envelopes. Ginny convinces her parents to allow her to travel to gain closure and then sets off on a whirlwind tour of Europe.

As Ginny travels to cities in more than half a dozen European countries, she meets people who were in some way important to Aunt Peg as well as new people who become important to herself. As Ginny puts together this puzzle of Aunt Peg's life, she learns that she, too, can be interesting. Not just learning things about her aunt, Ginny learns about her own strengths as well.



The narrators are very talented, and they do a great job of bringing the characters to life. The book itself explores what it's like to be Latino in the United States, especially in the city. It also explores mental health, strict parents, and a bit of culture. It's an amazing story that will make you wish there were more books like it. I recommend this audiobook as a fun way to spend some time during quarantine!

The Oz series and why you should read it!
An Introduction to L. Frank Baum's Oz

The Wizard of Oz is a household name that practically everyone knows. The 1939 movie is a revolutionary classic with its color, as is the artwork of the book that inspired this famous movie. But what most people don't know about Oz, is that it's a much larger world on the page than on the big screen. Although the Walt Disney Corporation acquired the rights to make movies based on all of Baum's other Oz novels following the success of The Wizard of Oz, they only produced one titled The Road to Oz, after Baum's Second Oz novel, since it did so poorly compared to MGM's take on the original classic.

In the last 19 years of his life, **L. Frank Baum's** main work was with a series of 14 books called the Oz series, which was so popular that

after the posthumous publication of his last two books, the publisher hired multiple authors to write under Baum's name to continue the series. The **MGM** movie based on the original book stops about three fourths of the way through the book, but (spoiler alert for an 80 year old movie) after Oz leaves in his balloon, the story continues in expanding the world building of the series. In future parts of this column I plan to take you into L. Frank Baum's amazing world of fantasy and prove to you why you should read more of it.
