20 Libraries - 20 Years of Service

This year, twenty area libraries are celebrating twenty years of sharing resources. **LOGIN**, the Libraries of Gloucester and Salem Information Network, will officially recognize this milestone with a reception and presentation on October 6, 2010.

The LOGIN consortium allows a cardholder to borrow materials from member libraries.

When area libraries started to use online databases, several forward-thinking library directors established a partnership to share materials. By 1991, twelve libraries in the county used this cost-effective means of providing service to their customers.

It became apparent in 2004 that a new consortium including all of the Gloucester County municipal libraries and Salem Community College would be very beneficial. Members now include the libraries of Gloucester County College, Gloucester County Institute of Technology, Salem Community College, Deptford, Franklin, Monroe Township, Newfield, Paulsboro, Pitman, Washington Township, Wenonah, West Deptford, Westville, and Woodbury and the branches of the Gloucester County Library in East Greenwich, Glassboro, Gibbstown, Logan, Mullica Hill, and Swedesboro.

We Made a Splash this Summer!

This summer the library saw increased participation in its summer reading programs.

43 kids participated in the Junior Book Club, reading 430 books with a total of 37,547 pages.

78 teens read 234 books for a total of 61,176 pages.

1,696 kids, ages 3-11, and caregivers made a splash and attended 56 children's programs this summer.

Teens caught the wave at the library. 44 teens in grades 6-12 attended programs.

Demystifying the Library

This is the second in a series to demystify the library.

Who are the librarians and what do they do?

A librarian is a professional with a Masters Degree in Library and Information Science. The library has 5 full-time librarians.

Kim Rinaldi is the Library Director. In addition to ordering all of the adult fiction books, she is responsible for the day-to-day operations of the library. She oversees the budget and staff, as well as working with the Board of Trustees. Right now, she has the added responsibility of planning for the library's move to the new building.

Debra Rosner is the Circulation Librarian. She oversees the staff that work behind the check-out desk, as well as keeping track of the library's circulation statistics, cardholders, and fines. She also orders all of the adult DVDs and audiobooks.

Deborah Riether is the Reference Librarian. She can usually be found behind the Reference Desk in the back of the library, where she can assist in finding information about anything. She keeps the materials in the reference department current and maintains and updates the computers. She is also responsible for the databases that are available and computer classes.

TR Salvadori is the Technical Services Librarian. He orders non-fiction materials, catalogs materials, and oversees the book processing department.

Theresa Doyle is the Youth Services Librarian. She orders all of the materials in the library for children—preschool through young adult. She also holds programs for teens and oversees the Teen Advisory Group.

The Friends of the Library support the library through fundraising, book sales, and other activities.


Thanks to a generous donation from the Friends, the library was able to have a successful summer reading program and provide many programs for adults.


